## Parish Council & Village News – December 2024 & January 2025

**The new bus service:** The scheduled Shire Community Transport route 94 service started on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> November, passing through the parish on the way from Oundle to Higham, Rushden and Rushden Lakes twice a day on weekdays.

The service is a little "erratic" at the moment, but we are hoping it will settle down soon. Similarly we are waiting on NNC to supply and install the new bus stop signs (or flags as they are known) so users know where to wait. The service includes free travel for bus pass holders after 9:30 am.

**Star & Garter:** The Star & Garter closed in August, whilst Charles Wells sought a new licensee to take over the running of the pub. We understand they are in talks with a potential new tenant.

Chelveston 20 mph zone: Following agreement by the Northants Speed Panel (a multi-agency panel of relevant officers from NNC, Highways, Police), the draft order will go out for statutory consultation to the wider community, so as to seek the views of those who drive through the parish and may be affected by the proposed 20 mph limit.

The Chelveston Environment Group: are getting ready for a series of local walks and nature-related activities in 2025. Would you like to help out? Whether you feel passionately about environmental issues or would just like to meet new people and join the team, everyone is welcome.

Ford depth markers: In January 2024, two cars got stranded in the fords during Storm Henk. The Council requested Highways investigate whether depth markers could be added to both the Water Lane and Bidwell Lane fords to aid motorists.

This required the road surfaces to be surveyed, as the markers need to show the water depth relative to the lowest point on the roads. This has been completed and a site meeting was held with Highways in November to agree the locations of the markers. They hope to have them installed shortly.

**305**<sup>th</sup> **BG(H) memorial works:** The lettering and colours on the granite slabs are starting to fade, so the memorial masons, WT Drage, will be carrying out some restoration works when the weather permits. This has been kindly funded by grants from the Windfarm Trust and the Foulger Trust.

Community Police meeting: Our local PCSO, Will Page, will be holding a community policing session in the Village Hall on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> January between 10am – Noon. This is your opportunity to raise any local issues with him.

**Chelveston Village Hall:** is independently owned and operated by one of the parish charities, the Educational Foundation of Abigail Bailey and Ann Levett, founded in 1760.

As reported in previous newsletters, the management of the Village Hall will become the responsibility of a new Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) in 2025. Formal approval from the Charity Commission is still awaited, but this should be a formality.

Many Village Halls are currently converting to become CIOs as the pool of willing volunteers diminishes. There are now so many regulations to be followed that it is difficult for volunteers to stay on top of them all as a "hobby", and it is unreasonable to hold them legally accountable for their actions.

Our new part time Village Hall Manager, Maxine Routledge, has hit the ground running and is working with Adrian Dale to implement a new online booking system for 2025. Janet McMillan is fortunately still handling all 2024 bookings and accounts management until new procedures are in place.

Routine grounds maintenance has been taken on by Karl Goodman of *Chelston Home and Garden Services*. Karl has previously undertaken fencing and car park repairs for the Village Hall, so we know him well. He has lots of equipment that we would otherwise have to hire, and the skills to maintain our grounds maintenance kit. He also tackles ad hoc small repair tasks on a voluntary basis, and recently rewelded a broken joint on our ballet barres.

Although these arrangements will cost more, the alternative is closing the Village Hall, leaving us without a civic venue and emergency reception centre. Contact details will also change. We now have a new number **01933 423 243** with an online switchboard service, so that calls can be redirected as required.

Two new classes are starting in January. Karina Bird of *Heart to Hand Dog Training* will be running classes twice a week on Monday and Sunday mornings. Robert Agar-Hutton of *Winghigh Tai-Chi* returns with monthly workshops every 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of the month.
